# REFLECTION

Change is an Integral Part of life

The Greek philosopher, Heraclitus, is known for his doctrine of change being the only constant in life, expressed famously as "No man ever steps in the same river twice". He wrote: "Change is the essence of life; the only thing that remains unchanged is the law of change". He believed that the universe was in a state of flux, always in a state of becoming. This ancient and profound truth reminds us that change is the only constant in existence. Nothing remains the same; everything transforms, adapts, and moves.

Today, in a rapidly changing world, this thought remains relevant. That one-second-old baby becomes a grown-up man/woman at different levels, such as physical and psychological, several years later. The apple seed that the farmer plants on his farm becomes a full-grown apple tree that produces many apples several years later.

The readings for this weekend's Liturgy of the Word, especially the Gospel, center on the idea of change. The first reading talks of a new relationship between God and his people. The prophet Isaiah tells the people that the Lord shall call them by a new name. In the second reading, the Apostle Paul talks about the various gifts or charisms, and all come from the same God. If these charisms are used as God intended, they will benefit the community. In the Gospel, Jesus changes water into wine, a symbol of the old order giving way to the new. The mission of Jesus was to change lives. He came to change the world and teach us how to love God and our neighbor. To change us from 'slaves of sin' to become children of God. As Rev. John Robinson puts it, "He changed people who were sick and made them well. He changed sinners by forgiving them and telling them to live good lives (sin no more). ... In his first miracle, he changed water into wine and changed what would have been a failed celebration into a great party." (Guiding Light, Trust, and Transform)

Jesus continues to call us to change. Blessed John Henry Newman says, "To live is to change, and to be perfect is to have changed often." Everyone wants a change, especially when we perceive the situation as bad. But how many people are willing to change? As Michael Jackson sang, "If you want to make the world a better place, take a look at yourself and then make a change." We become so comfortable with what we have and where we are that we resist change. "Change is hard because people overestimate the value of what they have—and underestimate the value of what they may gain by giving that up," says James Belasco and Ralph Stayer.

When Jesus called people to change their lives, it didn't always happen. Judas Iscariot, the Scribes, and the Pharisees come readily to mind. We have free will to accept or reject what God has spoken to us. He changed bread and wine into His Body and Blood, but still many do not believe His Real Presence in the Eucharist. The Eucharist can change us, and it will become more like Him.

I would like to conclude this reflection with the Serenity Prayer: "O God, give us the serenity to accept what cannot be changed, the courage to change what can be changed, and the wisdom to know the one from the other."
