

REFLECTION

My brothers and sisters in Christ, on this thirty-first Sunday in ordinary time, the message from our readings is the simple message at the heart of our faith, the command to love. Love God and love your neighbor. The Gospel reading builds on this teaching of love and links the law of Moses to the teaching of Christ. Please note that the question posed to Jesus by one of the Scribes expects Jesus to list just one commandment: "Which is the first of all commandments?" Jesus refuses to limit his answer to providing only the first or the most important commandment. Instead, He starts by repeating the command God gave Moses that we heard in our first reading. "The first is this: Hear, O Israel! The Lord our God is Lord alone! You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength." He then goes on, "The second is this: You shall love your neighbor as yourself. There is no other commandment greater than these." Jesus uses his answer to demonstrate that we cannot love God without loving our neighbor too. Jesus is teaching us that we cannot separate the two great commandments; we cannot have one without the other.

By expanding the answer, Jesus wanted the Scribe and all of us to understand that the Word of God is not to be sliced and diced. It is not to be manipulated. It is not to be consumed in bits and pieces. It is not to be quoted or referenced at our convenience. The Word of God is to be understood in its entirety. Scripture teaches that "love is of God" and that "everyone who loves is begotten by God and knows God". Adding that "Whoever is without love does not know God, for God is love". (John 4: 7-8). "Whoever loves God must also love his brother. If anyone says, 'I love God,' but hates his brother, he is a liar." (1 John 4: 20-21).

Our second reading explains why our routine sacrifices and formal worship add nothing to God unless we love God and our neighbor. The one, pure sacrifice of love consented by Christ "the perfect high priest" on "the altar of the Cross" suffices. "In this is love: not that we have loved God, but that he loved us and sent his Son as expiation for our sins. Beloved, if God so loved us, we also must love one another". (John 4: 10-11).

My dear friends in Christ, we have been commanded to go out and Love God and everyone. True love of neighbor springs from the love of God, and on the other hand, there can be no true love of God which does not express itself in love of neighbor. If we are to follow today's teaching to go out and love God and everyone, then, we need to work at love. We need to pray for the gift to love those we do not

know and those we dislike.

Some questions for your personal reflection this week: What actions have I undertaken in the distant or recent past to show my love of God by loving my neighbor? Do I see everyone as a neighbor or as an opponent in the ongoing election campaigns and upcoming general elections? What can I do in the coming days, weeks, months, or years to begin to lead a life that is centered on love of God by growing or deepening love for my neighbor?

Let us pray: Lord God, may our actions this week; be the acts directed to God or ones directed to humanity, may flow from hearts filled with love.



These classes are for members who wish to enter into full communion with the Catholic Church.
