REFLECTION

We celebrate today Divine Mercy Sunday, also known as the feast of God's Mercy. Saint Faustina's Diary records fourteen occasions when Jesus requested that a Feast of Mercy be observed as a refuge and shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners. The message of The Divine Mercy is simple. It is that God loves us – all of us. And he wants us to recognize that His mercy is greater than our sins, so that we will call upon Him with trust, receive His mercy, and let it flow through us to others. Thus, all will come to share His joy.

The opening prayer for Mass this Sunday and the readings speak of the mercy. The opening prayer addresses the Father as "God of everlasting Mercy." The first reading, shows us how the early Church grew every day because of the acts of mercy and sharing, practiced by the early Christians. In first verse of the Responsorial Psalm, we repeat three times, "His mercy endures forever!" In the second reading Saint Peter glorifies God who has revealed His mercy, first and foremost, by sending His only begotten Son to become our Savior and Lord by His suffering, death, and Resurrection. In the Gospel passage for this Sunday, the risen Lord gives the apostles the authority to forgive sins in His Name, together with the power of imparting God's mercy to the sinner, through the gift of forgiving sins from God's treasury of mercy. In the liturgy, the Church has proclaimed the mercy of God for centuries through the Word of God and the Sacrament of the Body and Blood of Christ. Divine Mercy Sunday focuses on the gift of mercy and love given through Christ's death, burial, and resurrection. As Pope John Paul II stated, "Divine Mercy reaches human beings through the heart of Christ crucified."

The message of mercy is that God loves us – all of us – no matter how great our sins. He wants us to recognize that His mercy is greater than our sins, so that we will call upon Him with trust, receive His mercy, and let it flow through us to others. Thus, all will come to share His joy. Fr John Pichappilly in his book "The Table of the Word" says; "It is a message we can call to mind simply by remembering ABC. A – Ask for His Mercy. God wants us to approach Him in prayer constantly, repenting of our sins and asking Him to pour His Mercy out upon us and upon the whole world. B - Be merciful. God wants us to receive His mercy and let it flow through us to others. He wants us to extend love and forgiveness to others just as He does to us. C -Complete trust in Jesus. God wants us to know that the graces of His mercy are dependent upon our trust. The more we trust in Jesus, the more we will receive".

Dear brothers and sisters, permit me to end this short reflection with these words of Saint Faustina: "Yes, the first Sunday after Easter is the Feast of Mercy, but there must also be deeds of mercy, which are to arise out of love for Me. You are to show mercy to your neighbors always and everywhere. You must not shrink from this or try to absolve yourself from it. (Diary 742)

Pope Francis' Prayer for the Year of Mercy Lord Jesus Christ, You have taught us to be merciful like the heavenly Father and have told us that whoever sees you sees him. Show us your face and we will be saved (A Year of Mercy December 2015 – November 2016). During your prayer and meditation this week, please answer these questions:

- a) Do I need of mercy?
- b) How do I show mercy to others? and
- c) Are there ways I can help make our world more merciful?

End your prayer and meditation with this greeting: Jesus! I trust in You (3 times).

Sacrament of Baptism: Parents must be registered with the Parish Office and must have regular attendance at Sunday Mass for at least six months and are required to attend a Preparation Class before the Baptism can be scheduled. Sacrament of Reconciliation: Will be held Wednesday evening from 5:20—5:50 PM, Saturday 4—4:45 PM, and Sunday 8:15—8:45 AM. Confession is also available by appointment at anytime. Please call the Parish Office to schedule an appointment.

Rite of Christian Initiation: The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA—15 years or older) and the Rite of Christian Initiation of Children (RCIC—7 to 14 yrs. of age), begins in August and ends during the Easter Vigil. These classes are for members who wish to enter in full communion with the Catholic Church. If you need to receive Baptism, First Reconciliation, First Communion and/or Confirmation, and are interested in attending RCIA/RCIC, please call the Parish Office at 304-754-7830.

Sacrament of Marriage: Engaged couples planning to marry at St. Bernadette Catholic Church should be practicing Catholics, participating in Sunday Eucharist regularly. Also they must participate in a Marriage Preparation Program. Call the Parish Office for information. At least six months notice is required. No date for a wedding will be set over the phone.

Holy Communion to the Sick and Homebound: When a Parishioner is confined to home or hospital because of illness or advanced age, call the Parish Office. We will be happy to make arrangements to bring Holy Communion.

Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick: Upon request and Communally as scheduled.
