

# **April 23, 2023** Third Sunday of Easter

The Road to Emmaus



#### Mission Statement:

#### REFLECTION

The three disciples, on the way to Emmaus, said something to Jesus that we do not advise any of our loved ones to do in this age. "Stay with us," they urged Jesus, even though they considered Him a complete stranger. It takes a great sense of security and a ready disposition to hospitality to do such a thing. In our time, people have become too fearful of one another, talk less of strangers, to invite strangers into their homes.

If you have been following the news, you would have heard of the young black man that was shot twice in the skull simply because, while searching for his younger twin brother relation, he mistakenly knocked or rang the wrong doorbell that fateful night. A young white girl was shot dead for simply turning into the wrong driveway.

While it is true that insecurity is a great concern in our time, it would be wrong to think that it was not for those disciples on the road to Emmaus. The two on the road to Emmaus is among Christ's followers who, in last Sunday's gospel passage, were so fearful for their lives that they barricaded themselves behind locked doors. The two did not let insecurity and fear act as a barrier. They chatted about the great signs Christ had worked before being crucified. Then they extended hospitality — "stay with us" - to an individual they considered a fellow traveler and a complete stranger.

The question for us on this third Sunday of Easter is: are we showing that same hospitality to Christ? Have we welcomed him in that stranger who comes knocking on our doors for assistance? Have we invited Christ into our lives? Have we invited Him into our homes? Have we invited Him into our families and into our hearts? Or are we still treating Him as a stranger, not as our brother, Lord, and Savior? Last Sunday's readings reminded us that He has never been a stranger. Even though we did not know Him, we loved Him, we heard last Sunday. In our second reading today, Saint Peter continues in that vein: "He was known before the foundation of the world".

Our first reading from the Acts of the Apostles clarifies that He was no helpless victim on the cross but "a man commended to you by God with mighty deeds, wonders, and signs" who was "delivered up by the set plan and fore-knowledge of God". It is of His resurrection that King David "foresaw and spoke," writes Saint Peter in our second reading. Crucified, he has been raised "from the throes of death" and is, forever, "exalted at the right hand of God".

Holy Mass for Catholics is like taking that journey to Emmaus all over. During Holy Mass, Jesus draws near and journeys with us, as He did with the two disciples on the road to Emmaus. We tell Him of the things going on in our lives. In the Liturgy of the Word, He opens the ears of our hearts and awakens the Holy Spirit within us, as He discusses what the prophets have said about Him, beginning with Moses. Then, if we are truly prepared and ready to receive Christ, He reveals Himself to us in the Eucharistic breaking of bread in Holy Communion.

Last weekend – Friday to Saturday, the Catholic Christians in the Martinsburg Vicarate gathered around our bishop at St James the Greater, Charles Town in the context of the ongoing Diocesan Eucharistic Revival whose overarching goal is to renew the Catholic Church by enkindling a living

relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist. We pray that Christ will use this Congress to open our eyes and the eyes of fellow American citizens to recognize that in Holy Communion He gives Himself to us – body, soul, and divinity, and may it renew our worship of Jesus Christ in the Eucharist. If we truly believed that He is alive we would trust in Him for all things and in all situations. He offers peace to us, even in difficult times, by inviting us to come close to Him and to touch Him, especially in the Eucharist. Nourished by Christ's Body and Blood and filled with His peace that surpasses all human understanding, may we relate and treat everyone with respect, knowing that He always shows us the path to life and with Him at our right hand we shall not be disturbed".

Fr Boh God bless you! May Saint Bernadette Soubirous, pray for us.

**Sacrament of Reconciliation:** Will be held Wednesday evening from 5:20—5:50 PM, Saturday 4—4:45 PM, and Sunday 8:15—8:45 AM. Confession is also available by appointment at anytime. Please call the Parish Office to schedule an appointment.

Rite of Christian Initiation: The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA—15 years or older) and the Rite of Christian Initiation of Children (RCIC—7 to 14 yrs. of age), begins in August and ends during the Easter Vigil. These classes are for members who wish to enter in full communion with the Catholic Church. If you need to receive Baptism, First Reconciliation, First Communion and/or Confirmation, and are interested in attending RCIA/RCIC, please call the Parish Office at 304-754-7830.

**Sacrament of Marriage:** Engaged couples planning to marry at St. Bernadette Catholic Church should be practicing Catholics, participating in Sunday Eucharist regularly. Also they must participate in a Marriage Preparation Program. Call the Parish Office for information. At least six months notice is required. No date for a wedding will be set over the phone.
