REFLECTION

Our readings today invite us to cultivate the virtue of humility. In the first reading from the Book of Ecclesiasticus, the author Ben Sirach, teaches us that if we perform our tasks with humility, we will be loved by those whom God accepts. "Humble yourself the more, the greater you are," says Sirach "and you will find favor with God." In the second reading, Saint Paul, in the Letter to the Hebrews, recommends that we approach with humility "Mount Zion... the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem" where we are to see God face-to-face and participate in the celestial banquet. In today's gospel passage, Jesus gives us some practical rules of humility, especially during celebrations. He urges us to extend charity without the expectation of being paid back.

Accepting the invitation to humility is very difficult. We have the "high table syndrome" in many of our cultures. Very few people accept to step down from positions of honor. For example, many presidents cannot bring themselves to step away from power and the glamor that comes with the office even when they are advanced in age or ousted at the ballot box.

As Catholics, we are lucky to be witnesses of a great example of humility from the leader of our church, Pope Francis. Almost everyone has heard the many stories of just how humble Pope Francis is. Journalists have told the stories of the Pope insisting to carry his own bags when he travels. He cooks his own food. He does not live in the luxurious Papal apartment. He is always trying to drive himself. Everyone who watched television coverage of his visit to the United States saw how the Pope refused to take the big limousines, in favor of driving in a tiny car which he brought with him. He has been captured in video images, kissing the feet of rebel leaders and government officials from South Sudan, pleading with them to make peace with each other. The leaders of our church have been setting such examples for us for a long time. Pope Emeritus, Benedict XVI showed just how humble he is by stepping down from the Papacy when he realized he could no longer do the job. Millions of people in his position would have preferred to hang on for the glory of the office.

Pope Francis says, "the only path to humility is humiliation". The truth is that we cannot be happy; cannot be successful; and will not have a good reputation if we are not humble. It is not easy to be humble when we live in a world and work in a culture that prices human exaltation. In our world, arrogance and aggression, pride and pomp, self-righteousness and self-assertiveness are paraded as the marks of importance. Yet humility remains a core value in the life of a Christian. On this challenge of being humble, Jesus invites us to learn from Him. "Take my yoke upon you," says the Lord, "and learn from me, for I am meek and humble of heart". Christ teaches us that the humble shall be exalted.

Let me be clear, to be humble does not mean denying the gifts God has given us. Rather, humility calls on us to use those gifts for the good of others, acknowledging that they come from God. As C.S. Lewis says: "True humility is not thinking less of yourself. It is thinking of yourself less" and thinking of others more. That is the example Jesus has given us. He never refused that he is God. Yet He "did not regard equality with God as something to be grasped. Rather, He emptied Himself, taking the form of a slave" (Philippines 2:6).

FROM THE ADMINISTRATORS DESK

Five First Saturdays: In Reparation to the Immaculate Heart of Mary.

What are the Five First Saturdays? Our Lady explained those Five First Saturdays to Sr. Lucia dos Santos, one of the Fatima visionaries, on Dec. 10, 1925, in the following way: See, my daughter, my Heart encircled by thorns with which ungrateful men pierce it at every moment by their blasphemies and ingratitude. Do you, at least, strive to console me. Tell them that I promise to assist at the hour of death with the graces necessary for salvation all those who, in order to make reparation to me, on the First Saturday of five successive months, go to Confession, receive Holy Communion, say five decades of the Rosary, and keep me company for a quarter of an hour, meditating on the ... mysteries of the Rosary.

Why five First Saturdays in particular? Jesus explained this to Sr. Lucia on May 29-30, 1930, saying: Daughter, the motive is simple: There are five kinds of offenses and blasphemies spoken against the Immaculate Heart of Mary.

First: blasphemies against the Immaculate Conception.

Second: against her Virginity.

Third: against the Divine Maternity, refusing, at the same time, to receive her as the Mother of mankind.

Fourth: those who seek publicly to implant, in the hearts of children, indifference, disrespect, and even hate for this Immaculate Mother.

Fifth: those who revile her directly in her sacred images.

Here, dear daughter, is the motive that led the Immaculate Heart of Mary to petition Me to ask for this small act of reparation. And, out of regard for her, to move My mercy to pardon those souls who have had the misfortune to offend her. As for you, seek endlessly, with your prayers and sacrifices, to move Me to mercy in regard to these poor souls. (By Fr. Donald Calloway, MIC; Spiritual Director of the Thirteenth of the Month Club)
