

A Continuation of the Sermon on the Mount

REFLECTION

In our daily lives, we are called to abide by state law, federal law, taxation law, etc. Our society rewards us with freedom if we uphold the laws. They punish us if we violate it. If the law says, "don't drink and drive", but we ignore it, we may get away with it once or twice or many times. However, eventually, the long arm of the law catches up with us and consequences follow.

As with the state or federal government, God has given us laws/commandments to guide us on our earthly pilgrimage. God's law – indeed, "God's wisdom, mysterious, hidden" - is not to be compared with the laws of "the rulers of this age" because they "are passing away", says Saint Paul in our second reading.

The first reading from the Book of Sirach reminds us that God has neither given us "license to sin" nor "to act unjustly". Instead, God has blessed us with a share of His "immense wisdom" to choose wisely. He has endowed us with Free Will to choose between "fire and water..., life and death, good and evil". If we choose to 'trust in God', we shall be saved; if we choose to keep His commandments, we shall live, writes Sirach. "Blessed are they who follow the law of the Lord", says the Psalmist.

Our gospel passage – a continuation of the Sermon on the Mount – disabuses those who lived in expectation that the coming of the Messiah would usher in a new Israel in which they would have freedom not only to disregard the laws of the Roman Empire which colonized them but also the many laws handed down by the prophets. Jesus says to them and to all of us: "Do not think I have come to abolish the law or the prophets. I have come not to abolish but to fulfill".

As a guide for leading holy lives, in faithful obedience of God's laws, Jesus invites us to disregard earthly yardsticks of holiness because "not the smallest letter or the smallest part of a letter will pass from the law". Jesus was preaching to His contemporaries who considered the scribes and Pharisees as the golden standard in holiness. He urges them and all of us to rise above the letter of the law: "Unless your righteousness surpasses that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will not enter the kingdom of heaven," Jesus warns.

Jesus wanted to show us that external compliance of the law is not the thing that matters but total commitment. He uses four of the six "it was said... but I say this to you" to draw home his message. He warns us of the dreadful punishment that awaits anyone who knowingly breaks any of his commandments or causes others to do the same. We are invited to rise above the external compliance of the law. It is possible for you to do a good deed to a person you hate just to retain your esteem before men. Or it is possible for a child to follow the instructions of a parent externally and do the dishes whereas internally he/she is not doing the dishes. Christ would approve of this type of behavior. He prefers to see our heart involved in whatever we are doing – that is total commitment and not just an external compliance.

The Christian must be a Christian and nothing short of it. This is why Christ encourages us to let our 'Yes' to be 'Yes' and our 'No' to be 'No'. Thus, there can hardly be a greater disservice to Christianity than oath-taking. Christians who lead one another to oath-taking show that they are like salt that has lost its taste because it means that mutual confidence is absent among them, that their 'Yes' can no longer be taken to mean 'Yes'.

Jesus has laid bare before us the way to eternal bliss and the way to eternal damnation. It is up to each one of us, using our Free Will, to make the choice. Every choice we make brings us closer to God or away from Him. However, if we choose the path that leads to damnation and teach others to do same, Jesus says we "will be called least in the kingdom of heaven".

May God give us the grace and the courage to use our Free Will to always make choices that will bring us to that eternal happiness.

WHAT IS GOING ON?

Distinction for Second Collections

Th diocesan website, www.dwc.org, states that, "We as Catholics are part of a universal Church – one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church. As part of this universal Church we are to support the pastoral care in our Diocese, in Dioceses across the country and around the world. We do this by supporting the Collections and Appeals approved by the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops and Bishop Brennan for specific needs of the Universal Church. These collections have taken on the name of Second Collections and go beyond our tithing to our own parish. These collections are used or forwarded to the appropriate agency for the specific collection intention."

On January 15th, the Second Collection was for the Church in the Developing World. This collection will be split between the Church in Latin America, Church in Central and Eastern Europe, and the Church in Africa. This collection supports pastoral programs as awarded by the Subcommittee in these areas. Projects include the work of evangelization, formation of laity, religious and seminarians, as well as youth ministry and catechesis. Funding is limited to programmatic expenses and excludes building construction except in cases of emergency.

Our next Second Collection is this weekend, February 12th. This is called Church Missions within the United States. This mission is for evangelizing the Black and Indian (native American) peoples of the United States. The funds are distributed as grants to dioceses throughout the United States, supporting and strengthening evangelization programs which otherwise would cease.

Donations to the "Second Collections" can be made using the envelope provided by mail or online at www.stberandettewv.org. Click "online giving" then "Diocesan Collection", click sub-fund and select the collection that you wish to donate to. Donations can be made at any time throughout the month. Collection remittances are paid to the Chancery 6 weeks after the date assigned for each collection.

These classes are for members who wish to enter in full communion with the Catholic Church. If you need to receive Baptism, First Reconciliation, First Communion and/or Confirmation, and are interested in attending RCIA/RCIC, please call the Parish Office at 304-754-7830.

Sacrament of Marriage: Engaged couples planning to marry at St. Bernadette Catholic Church should be practicing Catholics, participating in Sunday Eucharist regularly. Also they must participate in a Marriage Preparation Program. Call the Parish Office for information. At least six months notice is required. No date for a wedding will be set over the phone.

Holy Communion to the Sick and Homebound: When a Parishioner is confined to home or hospital because of illness or advanced age, call the Parish Office. We will be happy to make arrangements to bring Holy Communion.

Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick: Upon request and Communally as scheduled.

Society of Saint Vincent de Paul St. Joseph Conference 2022 Report to the Parishes

In 1999, the then pastor of St. Joseph Church, Father John DiBacco, proposed that our parish form a conference of the St. Vincent de Paul Society. A regional SVdP officer visited Martinsburg and some 35 + parishioners attended the formation session. As St. Bernadette was then a Mission of St. Joseph Parish, the jurisdiction of the conference was established to include Martinsburg, Hedgesville, Falling Waters, and Marlowe. Services are still provided to all of those areas.

Twenty-four years later, the St. Joseph Conference continues to thrive in its mission to offer spiritual development to its members and assistance to those in need in our community. During the more than two decades of the conference's existence, over one half million dollars has been collected and distributed to families and individuals who have asked for help.

In 2022, the conferenced received \$21,000 in donations from St. Joseph and St. Bernadette parishioners and \$3000 from the SVdP Thrift Store in Wheeling. \$25,400 in assistance was provided to 178 supplicants, totaling 260 individuals, and \$500 was contributed to disaster relief following the floods in other parts of WV. Payments provided helped with utility bills, rent, auto repairs, transportation, furniture, household items, and medical care and supplies. Four families comprised of seven adults and children who were living in vehicles were assisted in obtaining substantial housing.

YOU make this possible through your generosity. Our "overhead" is minimal and consists of a monthly cellphone bill and our annual insurance and business license fees. All of our members are volunteers. The eight individuals comprising our conference performed over 1,100 hours of volunteer service last year.

The current financial situation, fueled by inflation, has resulted in a sharp increase in requests for assistance over the last two months. In order to continue our support to those in need, we need YOUR continued generous contributions.

New volunteers are always encouraged to join St. Vincent de Paul and are welcomed. If you are interested in participating in our missionary work among the poor, please call the conference at 304-671-0569. One of our members will return your call and invite you to our monthly meeting. Many hands make light work!
