#### REFLECTION

My dear sisters and brothers in Christ, today is the third Sunday in Ordinary Time. In 2019, Pope Francis instituted the Sunday of the Word of God to be celebrated every year on the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time. Pope Francis says the Sunday of the celebration of the Word of God; "... can enable the Church to experience anew how the risen Lord opens up for us the treasury of his word and enables us to proclaim its unfathomable riches before the world" (Aperuit illus, no. 2). The world is often bogged down by despair and hopelessness. Events on the socio-political scene hardly make one excited or hopeful for a better future. Yet, God once more tells us that a bright light will shine upon the people walking in darkness and no darkness can overcome it. The tribes of Zebulun and Naphtali lived in the northern part of Palestine. At the time Isaiah utters his prophecy the Assyrian army had overrun it and was oppressing its inhabitants. The message was not entirely negative. Despite the dark days, Isaiah sees a light and uses striking images of hope against the backdrop of defeat. "God would raise their status [8:23a]. And a light would arise to dispel anxiety [8:23b] and to give them hope. That light would lead to liberation" [9:3] (cf. word-sunday.com). Isaiah is sure that the Assyrian armies, responsible for all the violence, will be defeated and driven out. Notice the themes of hope and freedom so traditional for Jews was now applied to non-Jews. Isaiah implicitly extended God's activity to the Gentiles of the area. This message of hope is not just for the inhabitants of Zebulon and Naphtali, but for all who hear God's word today. A bright light shines upon them. In his gospel, Matthew used Isaiah's more universal scope when he described the mobile ministry of Jesus. No matter who inhabited the land, God would bless them with a light, a leader to guide their way to spiritual liberation. For Matthew, that light was Jesus. This light is also known as the Word of God who calls men to Himself to save them. This Word calls on us today. He wants to give us life. How often do we meditate on the Word to allow it to truly speak to us, and influence our choices and decisions? "Your Word is a lamp for my feet, a light for my path" (Ps. 119:105). May the Lord bless His Word in our hearts! I wish you a fruitful celebration of Sunday of the Word of God. Fr Boh

**Sacrament of Reconciliation:** Will be held Wednesday evening from 5:20—5:50 PM, Saturday 4—4:45 PM, and Sunday 8:15—8:45 AM. Confession is also available by appointment at anytime. Please call the Parish Office to schedule an appointment.

Rite of Christian Initiation: The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA—15 years or older) and the Rite of Christian Initiation of Children (RCIC—7 to 14 yrs. of age), begins in August and ends during the Easter Vigil. These classes are for members who wish to enter in full communion with the Catholic Church. If you need to receive Baptism, First Reconciliation, First Communion and/or Confirmation, and are interested in attending RCIA/RCIC, please call the Parish Office at 304-754-7830.

**Sacrament of Marriage:** Engaged couples planning to marry at St. Bernadette Catholic Church should be practicing Catholics, participating in Sunday Eucharist regularly. Also they must participate in a Marriage Preparation Program. Call the Parish Office for information. At least six months notice is required. No date for a wedding will be set over the phone.
