

The Parable of the Weeds Among the Wheat

REFLECTION

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

In the Boh compound in my native village, Njinikom, Cameroon, still stands an avocado tree that we once encouraged our dad to cut down because it was producing very bad avocados. Our father did not yield to the pressure our mom and all of us brought to bear on him. Two or three years later, turned out that the avocado tree we had wanted our dad to cut down, started producing the best avocados of all the three avocado trees we had in our compound.

Our readings for this weekend's liturgy remind us of God's immense mercy and His forbearing patience. The first reading (Wisdom 12:13, 16-19) highlights that God "cares for all" of us. He governs us "with much lenience" and is "lenient to all". He, who is "master of might", judges us "with clemency", would "permit repentance" for our sins, and does not punish anyone unjustly. The reading closes with a warning in the form of advice: "those who are just must be kind". Patience, care, leniency, clemency, forgiveness of wrongs done or of sins committed and tampering justice with kindness are all virtues that all of us, notably the most powerful in our world tend to lack. We often complain about the evil in the world and wish God would uproot all evils and those who perpetrate them. Unlike God, whom the psalmist acclaims as "merciful and gracious, slow to anger, abounding in kindness and fidelity", many of us who wield only a little bit of power over our brethren tend to abuse that power or use it maximally. We think that not to use it, is to show that we don't possess it. But contrary to this human approach, the reading from the Book of Wisdom tells us that even though God possesses all power, God is not a tyrant. He is so gentle that no challenge to His power can provoke a violent response, as is the case with human dictators or strongmen.

A beautiful illustration of this fact, which is at the same time a wonderful illustration of the difference between us and God, is found in our gospel passage today. The man who sowed the seed is surely God and see how He contains with the impatience of his servants (represent us), who take a great interest in the field and go to their master and asked to uproot the weeds immediately. The master's answer to the request reveals God's attitude towards the evil that exists in the world, in the Church, and in every individual.

Unlike us, humans, God does not consider anyone of us as irredeemably evil or as purely good. Like the weed which the master of the field allows to grow with the wheat, God is patient with us in our evil ways and gives us a long rope to draw in the hope that we would turn from evil. He allows both evil and good to grow and thrive in our world, pending the time of judgment when the Angels will be sent out to separate the lamb

from the sheep; those who have been saved from those who are condemned to the fires of Hell.

The big lesson to draw from today's readings is the need for us to be patient with one another. Those who wield power should combine it with justice and kindness. Jesus is telling us that good and evil will always grow together, and it will be like that to the end of time. The separation will not happen now, or today, or this year. It was thanks to our dad's patience that we were able to enjoy and continue to enjoy the good avocados that this so called 'good for nothing tree', according to our judgment produced and is producing. Permit me to end this reflection with these words of Flor McCarthy: "While we distinguish clearly between good and evil, we must aim at being as understanding and tolerant as God is. The time for judgement is not yet. The Kingdom of God is still at the growing stage. Now is the time for conversion. People can change. We can change" (New Sunday & Holy Day Liturgies, Year A). May God help us to become little more as He is. Amen.
