

# June 4, 2023 The Most Holy Trinity



For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through him. John 3:17

### REFLECTION

Theme: "Greeting One Another with a Holy Kiss". Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

On this Sunday, as we celebrate the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity, Saint Paul invites all of us, Christians, to be love. "Greet one another with a holy kiss".

In the days of Saint Paul as in many parts of the world, people greet with a kiss on the cheek. This gesture of friendship and acceptance is also one of the most widely recognized external display of affection and camaraderie.

A kiss conveys love, but it can convey evil. Judas Iscariot betrayed Jesus with a kiss. In business circles, the phrase "kiss of death" is used to describe any failure or shortcoming that could bring a company to its knees.

One participant in our Gospel Sharing sessions (which holds every Monday night) told us about how people on Facebook clicked "likes" or "thumbs down" while commenting on a picture depicting a woman kneeling in prayer in a church, with her hands resting on a chair. However, what caught everyone's attention was the dress she wore, which exposed her entire back. One commentator wrote: "Is that how you dress to go before God in prayer?" Another said: "Just look at her! After she has gone around doing all sorts of things, she runs to God to beg for forgiveness". Yet, another said: "Surely, God cannot hear her prayers dressed like that".

Very often, instead of spoiling our neighbors with the holy kiss of love, we are quick to judge and even quicker to condemn. Like the commentators on Facebook, we try to substitute for God, determining what we think God appreciates or not. We are quick to forget that the Triune God – Father, Son, and Spirit, we celebrate today, is all loving, merciful, and gracious.

For the record, I am not saying dressing half-naked to any public place let alone going to church dressed in like manner is okay. I am saying we can refrain from judging and condemning others. That is the big lesson from today's gospel passage. Although God had every reason to be angry with the "stiff-necked" people led by Moses and even with us who have turned our backs on Him by indulging in sin, God sent Christ into the world not to condemn it, but to save it. Unlike the Facebook likes and condemnations, Christ did not come to point out how awful we are as sinners. Instead, He sees beyond your being fully dressed or half-naked. He sees our hearts and bothers not with the outside but with the inside. This

is how God saw David as he danced before the Ark of the Covenant having laid aside his royal robes and was "wearing a linen ephod" a garment usually reserved for priests and those ministering before the Lord, but his wife Michal a naked David dancing before the Ark of the Covenant.

Moses gives us an example in our first reading on how to conduct ourselves in such situations. Recognizing the sins committed by the "stiff-necked" people of Israel against God, Moses did not - like the people of Facebook - say God will never hear their prayer, aware that "whoever believes in Him will not be condemned". Moses interceded for them. He prayed that he may find favor with God and that God may claim the "stiff-necked" people as his own. Our job, as Christians, is to emulate Moses by interceding for our brothers and sisters and not to condemn them. The Holy Scriptures warns us against such a condemnatory attitude: "Stop judging, that you may not be judged" (Mt. 7:1). "Do not speak evil of one another, brothers ..." (Jas. 4:11). "Stop judging by appearances, but judge justly" (Jn. 7:24). Instead of condemning others, we are to do as Saint Paul instructs in our second reading: trust in our Lord, who is "a merciful and gracious God, slow to anger and rich in kindness and fidelity".

Let us pray during this Holy Mass to heed Saint Paul's advice to mend our ways, to encourage one another, ..., and to live in peace with one another so that "the God of love and peace" might be with us always. Let us pray that God may find favor with us by having us in "the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ and the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit". Let us, as members of Saint Bernadette, pray for the strength to embrace one another with the "holy kiss" of the unconditional love which God showed by sending His Only Son to save us. May our celebration of the Solemnity of the Trinity help us to trust God and truly love one another. May we be united; live in peace, and the God of love and peace will be with us. Amen.

**Sacrament of Reconciliation:** Will be held Wednesday evening from 5:20—5:50 PM, Saturday 4—4:45 PM, and Sunday 8:15—8:45 AM. Confession is also available by appointment at anytime. Please call the Parish Office to schedule an appointment.

Order of Christian Initiation: The Order of Christian Initiation of Adults begins in August and ends in April. These classes are for members who wish to enter into full communion with the Catholic Church. If you need to receive Baptism, First Reconciliation, First Communion, and/or Confirmation, and are interested in attending OCIA, please call the Parish Office at 304-754-7830.

**Sacrament of Marriage:** Engaged couples planning to marry at St. Bernadette Catholic Church should be practicing Catholics, participating in Sunday Eucharist regularly. Also they must participate in a Marriage Preparation Program. Call the Parish Office for information. At least six months notice is required. No date for a wedding will be set over the phone.

Holy Communion to the Sick and Homebound: When a Parishioner is confined to home or hospital because of illness or advanced age, call the Parish Office. We will be happy to make arrangements to bring Holy Communion.

Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick: Upon request and Communally as scheduled.
