

Healing of the Blind Man by Jesus Christ

4TH SUNDAY OF LENT MARCH 19, 2023

#### REFLECTION

Beloved sisters and brothers in Christ,

Today we celebrate the Fourth Sunday of Lent. Today is the halfway mark of the Sundays of Lent. This Sunday is known as Laetare Sunday – it is a Sunday of joy. It is a day of celebration because we have been living our Lenten promises and are beginning to see the light of Easter joy. Today's Entrance Antiphon invites us to rejoice in these words: "Rejoice, Jerusalem, and all who love her. Be joyful, all who were mourning; ..." Let us rejoice, like the man born blind and is given sight by Jesus in today's Gospel story.

In our Gospel passage last Sunday, we encountered a Samaritan woman who came to draw water from the community well. At the well she met Jesus and because Jesus lovingly accepted her, she became Jesus' first missionary. We were told that the people of Samaria were moved by the woman's witness and came to believe in Jesus. In today's Gospel passage, the Lord Jesus restores sight to a man who had been blind since birth and the people are divided on their opinion of Jesus. The healing of the blind man divides them into two camps: there are those who can see who Jesus is by the miraculous signs that He performs and those who are so blinded by their own preconceived notions about the coming Messiah and about their own Law that they condemn Jesus for this tremendous act of compassion. Jesus does not correspond to their idea of a religious man.

That's the effect that Jesus always seems to have on people. Jesus and His words as well as His actions mean something and so there is always a reaction – a mixed reaction. We shouldn't be surprised by that since He warned us about it Himself. The One who we call the Prince of Peace is the One who said: "Do not think that I have come to bring peace upon the earth. I have come to bring not peace but the sword" (Mt. 10:34).

What prevented the Pharisees from coming to the right conclusion about Jesus? It was because of the darkness of their hearts. They had bitterness in their hearts against Jesus, and this bitterness expressed itself in all their assessment of His words and deeds. In the Gospel passage last Thursday, we saw the Pharisees accuse Jesus of casting out devils by the power of Beelzebub. They could not see the goodness in the deeds of Jesus, not because Jesus lacked the goodness, but because they were bereft of goodness themselves.

What does this tell us? That our internal colors our perception of reality, that our internal influences our assessment of facts as they present themselves to us. There were many people who opposed one of Saint John Paul II's encyclical, Veritatis Splendor, because it did not agree with their worldview. The encyclical sought to uphold the objectivity of morality. Because

its opponents didn't like this idea, they took up bitter criticisms of the Pope and that encyclical. It was like calling the dog a bad name to hang it. There can be no denial that there are acts which are bad in themselves. Those who opposed the Pope for upholding this moral principle resemble the Pharisees in today's Gospel who judge from their hearts rather than from their minds.

Beloved in Christ, let us examine ourselves to see who represents us in this Gospel passage: the blind man or the Pharisees? Do we allow our prejudices to dictate our evaluation of issues and persons – like the Pharisees – or do we allow facts to speak to us as they are – like the blind man?

**Sacrament of Baptism:** Parents must be registered with the Parish Office and must have regular attendance at Sunday Mass for at least six months and are required to attend a Preparation Class before the Baptism can be scheduled. To register for the Preparation Class, please call the Parish Office at 304-754-7830.

**Sacrament of Reconciliation:** Will be held Wednesday evening from 5:20—5:50 PM, Saturday 4—4:45 PM, and Sunday 8:15—8:45 AM. Confession is also available by appointment at anytime. Please call the Parish Office to schedule an appointment.

Rite of Christian Initiation: The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA—15 years or older) and the Rite of Christian Initiation of Children (RCIC—7 to 14 yrs. of age), begins in August and ends during the Easter Vigil. These classes are for members who wish to enter in full communion with the Catholic Church. If you need to receive Baptism, First Reconciliation, First Communion and/or Confirmation, and are interested in attending RCIA/RCIC, please call the Parish Office at 304-754-7830.

**Sacrament of Marriage:** Engaged couples planning to marry at St. Bernadette Catholic Church should be practicing Catholics, participating in Sunday Eucharist regularly. Also they must participate in a Marriage Preparation Program. Call the Parish Office for information. At least six months notice is required. No date for a wedding will be set over the phone.

Holy Communion to the Sick and Homebound: When a Parishioner is confined to home or hospital because of illness or advanced age, call the Parish Office. We will be happy to make arrangements to bring Holy Communion.

Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick: Upon request and Communally as scheduled.

Why should you consider growing vegetables either at the St. Bernadette's vegetable gardens or at your own home?



- Family Community Service- Donate locally to organizations that relieve hunger. e.g., Hedgesville Loaves and Fishes, Martinsburg Union Rescue Mission, Immanuel's House, St. Vincent De Paul Society clients, Mary's Refuge, etc.
- > **D**o Corporal Works of Mercy
- Learn or share knowledge of how to grow a better garden with other parishioners.
- Know precisely what went into growing the vegetables.
- Possibly become part of a fresh produce distribution network which provides thousands of servings per year to those in need.
- > Assist home gardeners by gleaning their excess produce and tree fruits.
- Enjoy a portion of the produce raised in your home at family meals.

At the St. Bernadette vegetable gardens, many hands can make growing vegetables an enjoyable encounter and opportunity to put your faith into action with fellow parishioners. We gather in small groups once per week for no more than 1.5 hours per session. Parents are welcome to bring their children. Our timeline is flexible within the limited windows of opportunity that "mother nature" gives us each growing season.
