# REFLECTION

"I will not leave you orphans; I will come to you." Beloved brothers and sisters in Christ,

In many parts of the world, including here in the United States, where many households are headed by single mothers and where so many millions of women are the breadwinner of the family, the widow and the orphan are generally still considered among the most vulnerable human beings. In Kom, the traditional kingdom in the Northwest Region of Cameroon, where I was born and raised, the vulnerability of orphans and widows is made worse by abuse, notably the younger the victims are. Under the matrilineal system, it is your younger brother – not your son – who is your heir in Kom. If you do not have a brother, the heir is automatically your nephew - one of the sons of your sister.

This is a hard-to-swallow tradition, and the outrage only adds on when a brother or nephew-successor mistreats the orphans and the widow, including in the case of young widows. Young widows have had to fight off abusive marital arrangements and sexual abuse. Wicked successors have driven widows out of the estate she worked so hard to build with her late husband. About 60 percent of successors in Kom sell either part or all the property they inherit. Orphans are often disinherited. You can easily imagine how troubled wives and children are to know that their spouse or father is nearing the end of their earthly life.

In ancient biblical culture and among the Jewish people, who share the Kom tradition, orphans along with widows and resident aliens were among the most vulnerable people. As a Jew, Jesus Christ knew the culture of His people and the vulnerabilities His young bride (the Church) and His followers (orphans) would face once He was gone. That is why Christ, as the Head of His Family (the Church) insisted on reassuring His followers that He will continue to assume His responsibility to guard and protect them. He promises them protection and guidance: "... I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate to be with you".

Husbands who are aware of the abuse inherent in all traditions – whether in a small, traditional kingdom like my native Kom, or in a modern democracy like the United States, try to pre-empt or forestall any fears. In my native Kom, fathers apportion their children land and help them build their own homes before any abusive successor comes along. They make similar arrangements to protect their widows.

In today's gospel passage - a continuation of Jesus' farewell speech, a part of which we heard last Sunday - He acknowledges that His young bride (the Church) and disciples (orphans) would face the harsh realities of life without their family head. Thus, Jesus promises: "I will not leave you as orphans; I will come to you",

(John 14:18). Further, He says: "And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate to be with you always, the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot accept, because it neither sees nor knows him." Jesus refers to this Spirit as "Paraclete" – the word used to refer to one's advocate/lawyer, comforter, protector, or counsellor. The Holy Spirit, the "Paraclete", will be on their side, speak on their behalf, and help them overcome difficulties, whether these come from the community or from the sins, frailties, or personal evil inclinations of the disciples themselves.

Petrified and feeling as vulnerable as orphans and widows tend to be when they lose their family head, the disciples waited, in prayer, in the Upper Room for the outpouring of this Spirit. It empowered them to carry out their mission faithfully and successfully as we hear in the Acts of the Apostles regarding conversions in Samaria.

Today's gospel passage renews that assurance to the Church and to us, members of the Church. We are invited to have hope that the world cannot explain because our Father will never leave us as orphans! Nor will He abandon us (Philippians 1:3–6; Hebrews 13:5). He has given us a Helper to fill and equip us. Let us pray, notably during this Mass and during our Novena Prayer in preparation for Pentecost, for a personal relationship with the Holy Spirit.
