REFLECTION

Beloved brothers and sisters in the Lord, welcome!

A hearty welcome to those worshiping with us for the first time. Thank you for choosing to worship with us this weekend! Today we celebrate the Sixth Sunday of Easter in Church Year B. The central theme of today's readings is love. We are invited to reflect on how to love one another just as Christ has loved us. However, I would like to focus my reflection on these words of St Peter taken from today's first reading: "Get up. I myself am also a human being." These words of Peter speak to his humility and to the fact that he sees himself as a mere instrument in the hands of God. Peter resisted the temptation of being treated as a god by Cornelius. Peter had walked on water, had been a disciple of Jesus, had spoken in languages he never knew before, had healed the sick, and just recently raised a woman from the dead in Joppa. He might have felt the temptation toward elitism, toward pride, to have a Roman centurion bow to him. Peter did not allow these things to go into his head; "Stand up. I myself am also a human being". He knew that all that he had done was by the power of Christ. He is a mere mortal, and that it was by His grace, and not any merit of his own, that he was chosen to be an apostle of Christ. Therefore, he did not deserve any special respect or homage paid to him as if he was more than a man. Not to us, LORD, not to us, but to your name give the glory". (Ps.115:1)

Paul and Barnabas will face a similar situation in Lystra from a crowd following their healing of a man crippled from birth and like Peter, they would resist the temptation. Upon hearing what they had done, the people say of them: "The gods have come down to us in human form". Acts. 14:11) They tore their garments—a public expression of dismay—and will say, "Men, why are you doing these things? We also are men of like passions with you, and bring you good news, that you should turn from these vain things to the living God, who made the sky and the earth and the sea, and all that is in them". (Acts 14:15)

The Apostles, Peter, Paul, and Barnabas would not recognize our world today. We live in an era sometimes characterized by its "Cults of Personality." People appear to have an insatiable appetite to be known and have their "ten minutes of fame." Many do all they can to be recognized on social media. Many of us, Christians, sign on to idol worship by viewing and treating our preferred political leaders as demi-gods. We do the same when we treat our preferred priests as demi-gods. Pastors show lack of humility when they wallow in the praise that some Christians lavish them with. Happily, good examples exist. Many stories of humility are told about the Holy Father, Pope Francis. One example, Pope Francis set was electing to ride in a tiny car, during his visit to the United States, shunning the glamor of luxurious SUVs.

The mission that Christ entrusted to his first disciples was unstoppable because of the humility and dedication

of the disciples. And as one author rightly puts it: "Their work was not about gaining themselves an audience. They do not want to be treated as special people. They recognize they are human, made of flesh and blood like everyone else, save for one distinction: They realize that they are saved by the grace of God given them in Christ Jesus!"

Brothers and sisters, the relay baton has been passed-on to us. In today's Gospel Jesus reminds us: "It was not you who chose me, but I who chose you and appointed you to go and bear fruit that will remain". It is by His grace, and not any merit of our own, that have been chosen to be priests, deacons, animators, lectors, etc. in the Church. Do we at times feel superior to others? Do we refuse privileges or titles? May the humility of Peter be our inspiration and guide as we strive to serve the Lord. May Saint Bernadette Soubirous, pray for us.



Also they must participate in a Marriage Preparation Program. Call the Parish Office for information. At least six months notice is required. No date for a wedding will be set over the phone.


