REFLECTION

Let Our 'YES' to God at Baptism, Remain 'YES' Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

In Njinikom – the village, nesting in the rolling mountains of the northwest region of Cameroon where I was born and raised - it was, while I was growing up, and still is to this day, a taboo for a child to look their parents or an elder in the eye. You are expected to look away; to look to the ground; or even to look past the parent or elder giving you instructions. Doing so is considered a sign of respect.

This is the case in many cultures as well. I believe that in all cultures, it is a taboo for a child to rebel against instructions being given to them by their parents or an elder. Here in the United States as in my own culture, I believe it remains intolerable to give a grudging response to anything your father or mother say to you that is not morally wrong or evil. I take this roundabout route just to say the Fourth Commandment "Honor your father and your mother" — as many other commandments are already a part of our culture. Children are to obey their parents. They are expected to carry out their instructions or do their will in everything that's good.

So, when Jesus taught today's parable, He was aware that the culture of His followers prepared them to understand what it means to do the Will of the Father.

Today's gospel teaching is not only about a story. It is not about those two sons – one who said "YES" but did not do his father's will and the other who said "NO" and then did his father's will. We are invited by today's gospel passage to see ourselves in those two sons. As Christians and children of God; as sons and daughters of God, we have all said "YES" in Baptism, Marriage, and Holy Orders to do the Will of God. Today's gospel passage invites us to consider how well we have lived up to the "YES" we have given to Our Father in Heaven.

How different are we from the son who said "YES" to his father but did not execute on that "YES"? Are we any better than those who first rejected the teachings of Christ by saying "I will not, but afterwards changed (their) mind"?

As children of God, all of us, Christians, should be ashamed for saying "NO" to God or to our parents, for that alone constitutes sinning against the Fourth Commandment. With that prejudice in mind, I have always been tempted to condemn both sons. The answer given to Jesus was to recognize that the son who said "NO" but later changed his mind is the one who did his father's will.

The lesson to all of us, who call ourselves Christians because we have said "YES" to God Our Father, is that those whom we see today as having said "NO" may be the ones who change their minds, in the end, and will be rewarded for doing God's will. Yes, says Jesus, Israel made a lot of beautiful promises, but did not keep them. The pagans, judged by Israel to be unworthy to enter the Kingdom of God because they said "NO", will instead be the first to enter.

The story teaches us that God still has two kinds of sons. In our Church, in our parish community, in our families – whether those families live in my native Njinikom or here in Hedgesville or elsewhere around the world – these sons have two reactions upon receiving the Word of God.

As children of God, we are divided into two categories. There are those – sons and daughters of God - who have said "YES" at their baptism, and then spend the rest of their lives by

changing that "YES" into a "NO". Then, there are those sons and daughters of God who, even though not baptized, even if they initially said "NO" to follow God's Will, have changed their minds and walk as true children of God.

Let us all confess this truth: all too often, most – if not all – of us behave like the first son. We are rarely bold enough to say "NO". We behave as the culture in my village demands by not looking God in the face; we look to the ground or look past our parents when they give us instructions to follow God's ways, but we really have no intention of doing their will.

There is a second lesson we can draw from this parable. It is that God is always ready to leave our past behind when we change our mind and do His Will. This is what the first reading also addressed. This is the reason why God will not look behind to punish us. Consequently, we should not remonstrate with God when He admits the prostitute who repents and returns to Him. God is always ready to accept any sinner who repents and to punish any just person who changes his/her mind. Let us pray for the grace to be constant in doing good.
