### FROM THE ADMINISTRATORS DESK

Our readings for this 29th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Church Year C, invite us to wait on the Lord with confidence in His justice, and to pray without being weary, for our God who never fails, will see to it that justice is done for His people speedily. The use of the word "speedily" in our gospel passage may feed impatience on our part, if we think God measures time the same way as we do.

From the readings of last Sunday, we saw that deliverance from leprosy happened in a flash. The Syrian General, Naaman, was cured once he plunged seven times in the River Jordan. The ten lepers were cured while still on the way to show themselves to the priests. Jesus told the Samaritan leper who came back to give thanks to God: "Go, your faith has saved you". Today's readings carry forward with that theme of faith, demonstrating why it is important not only to have faith, but to ensure that we have faith and take the necessary action. We know that if we want to get a good harvest, we must spend long hours working in the field and not praying in the church. Today, we see people praying and concretely doing something for a positive outcome. We are reminded that the solution to our daily struggles and quest have both a spiritual and physical dimension.

In our first reading, Moses had faith that God will deliver victory to the people of Israel in battle against Amalek. However, he did not just pray about it. He ordered Joshua to take military action. As the battle raged, Moses went up the mountain to pray that God may deliver Israel. Unlike with the healing of the lepers in our readings of last Sunday, victory did not come in a flash. We are told that Moses prayed all day, with his hands held high. Aaron and Hur had to erect a seat for him on a rock. They had to hold Moses' arms up all day for Israel to defeat the Amalekites.

In our gospel passage, the widow who wanted justice before the judge who feared neither God, nor respected any human being, never lost patience and never grew weary of asking for justice. It is because she persisted that the judge finally heard her cry and rendered the justice she deserved.

If we, too, believe that we deserve justice in battle against our enemies; if we want justice in court against our adversaries, we must emulate the widow, Moses, Joshua, Aaron and Hur. We must have faith, but even more importantly, we must act, praying without ceasing for God's help.

As in the time of Moses, our enemy – like the Amalekites – are at war against us. As in the time of the widow in the gospel, we, too, live in a world where the very powerful have neither fear for God nor respect for other human beings. The powerful are willing to deny justice to the poor, the widow.

In our world, as in the time of Moses and of the widow, our common human destiny is one. We are linked to the country and in our world. If we are leaders of our community, like Moses, our most important job is to lead them in worship. If we are Joshua, it is our role to lead them in battle. Aaron and Hur show the rest of us how we can support our leaders. Life is full of trials and adversities, but with God there is hope. Let us make the words of the Responsorial Psalm our prayer to God — "I lift up my eyes to the mountains; from where shall come my help. My help is from the Lord, who made heaven and earth". Ours is a God who "neither slumbers nor sleeps", continues the Psalmist. If we want to grow and persevere in faith until the end of our days, then we must nourish our faith with the Word of God. Sacrament of Reconciliation: Will be held Wednesday evening from 5:20—5:50 PM, Saturday 4—4:45 PM, and Sunday 8:15—8:45 AM. Confession is also available by appointment at anytime. Please call the Parish Office to schedule an appointment.

Rite of Christian Initiation: The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA—15 years or older) and the Rite of Christian Initiation of Children (RCIC—7 to 14 yrs. of age), begins in August and ends during the Easter Vigil. These classes are for members who wish to enter in full communion with the Catholic Church. If you need to receive Baptism, First Reconciliation, First Communion and/or Confirmation, and are interested in attending RCIA/RCIC, please call the Parish Office at 304-754-7830.

Sacrament of Marriage: Engaged couples planning to marry at St. Bernadette Catholic Church should be practicing Catholics, participating in Sunday Eucharist regularly. Also they must participate in a Marriage Preparation Program. Call the Parish Office for information. At least six months notice is required. No date for a wedding will be set over the phone.

Holy Communion to the Sick and Homebound: When a Parishioner is confined to home or hospital because of illness or advanced age, call the Parish Office. We will be happy to make arrangements to bring Holy Communion.

Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick: Upon request and Communally as scheduled.
