

The Late-arriving Workers, from Art in the Christian Tradition

#### REFLECTION

THEME: "We Must Not be Envious Because God is Generous".

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

The joy of parents overflows when their unemployed son or daughter finds gainful employment. That joy overflows when that son or daughter is recruited on an open-ended contract, allowing them to keep their jobs until retirement or until they choose to quit or resign.

Our readings for this weekend Masses, remind us that God is running a job fair that has extended an open-ended contract to all of us. All of us have been invited by God to enter full employment in his vineyard. The job comes with full pay in the joys and happiness of Heaven, not only for a lifetime, but for all eternity.

Today's gospel passage (Mt 20:1-16a) reassures us that the job fair God is running for his vineyard is open for hiring at all hours: at dawn; at nine o'clock; during the noon hour; during the mid-afternoon, or just before the close of business. The bottom-line is God does not want us to be idle. Rather, He wants us working in his vineyard and He promises us full pay in the joys and happiness of Heaven, whether we are hired in the first hour or during the last hour of business.

The ongoing strike by United Auto Workers who are mounting pressure on the Detroit Big Three auto makers – Ford Motor Company, General Motors, and Stellantis – to offer fair salaries, highlight how human beings reward each other compared to how God rewards us. The best part of the open-ended contract God has extended to us is in the certainty that God is just, and his generosity is boundless. Unlike human beings, God will reward all of us justly.

We are, therefore, not to be jealous of any fellow Christian just because we think that they worked for only a short time in God's vineyard but will be as handsomely rewarded as those Christians who toiled in the vineyard all their lives. As human beings, we think that it would be just and fair for the workers who toiled from the very first hour to be rewarded at a higher pay scale than those who worked only during the last hour. God's generosity gives us "what is just" should never be compared to the generosity of human beings who tend to be stingy with generosity.

Lest any of us should get comfortable thinking that they will be first by joining God's workforce last; lest any of us be misguided into waiting until the last hour of our lives to be hired into God's vineyard, the Prophet Isiah in our first reading (Is 55:6-9) warns that it may be too late to find God or join God's work force.

Accordingly, the Prophet Isiah encourages all of us to "seek the Lord while he can be found, call him while he is near". For, while God is "generous in forgiving" our transgressions; while God "...is near to all who call upon him", we will not know any of God's forgiveness unless we "turn to the Lord for mercy". We are encouraged to return to a God "who is generous in forgiving." And it is in this context of forgiveness and mercy that Isaiah says, "My thoughts are not your thoughts ... my ways are above your ways." We are never to compare God to human beings. For God's thoughts are not our thoughts. What are our

thoughts? Usually, we think of strict justice, fair dealings. We could say we stick to the rules. We do not cheat but we do not want to be cheated either. We do not want to be losers, so we make sure other people won't have from us more than they deserve — "in all justice" we say. God is more than just, He is generous. And this is not easy for us to understand. God is so much greater than our understanding. He Himself tells us very clearly as the prophet Isaiah notes: "As high as the heavens are above the earth so high are my ways above your ways and my thoughts above your thoughts".

We know this, yet at times, we would like to tell God what He should do. We may not speak out loud what is in our minds, but we think: "If I were God, I would do things differently". When we hear today's gospel, we may think: "He is just, yes, but ..." "Yes, but ..." This may suggest that we feel a little jealous. Perhaps Jesus could tell us as He did to the worker: "Why be envious because I am generous?"

Let us pray for the humility to recognize that whatever reward we will receive from God is just and is given, freely, to us by God. Our reward is not earned by how many hours or how many days or years we convince ourselves that we have toiled in the vineyard of God in this world. Let us pray for the grace not to be envious when God shows his generosity to all, even those we think are not deserving of God's love, recognizing that God's ways are not our ways; nor are God's thoughts our thoughts.
