REFLECTION

Dear friends in Christ, this weekend we celebrate the third Sunday in Advent, known as Gaudete Sunday. Gaudete is Latin for Rejoice! Today is appropriately called Gaudete Sunday because the coming of Israel's redeemer, our Savior is soon to be fulfilled with the birth of Jesus at Christmas. Thus, the theme of 'REJOICING' is central to our celebration today. It is a very special Sunday in the Church. The priest dresses in a pink chasuble, as well as the third candle of the Advent wreath, also pink, is lit to represent joy in anticipation of Christmas. It is particularly beautiful because within the atmosphere of attentively waiting for the arrival of the savior and austerity, the liturgy pauses to invite us to remember that we must look forward to it with joy; that is why it is called 'Sunday of joy'. And truly our Mass this day is one of rejoicing. From our entrance antiphon where we sing "Rejoice in the Lord always; again, I say, rejoice. Indeed, the Lord is near," to our opening Collect, where we hear of celebrations and rejoicing and to our readings especially the first reading where the prophet Isaiah highlights the signs associated with the Messiah's arrival; healing to broken hearts, liberty to captives, and a year favored or blessed by the Lord.

What does it mean to be joyful? Joy, we should remember, is one of the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit (Gal. 5:22-23). To be joyful in the Christian sense is more than a happy feeling. It is a lasting emotion that comes from the choice to trust that God will fulfill his promises. It entails living an authentic Christian life; that is, turning away from sin and all that entices us, and returning to God wholeheartedly. Joy is not just an emotion but is also an internal spiritual disposition. It can persist in the harshest of circumstances because it depends on God and his promises. "Blessed are you when they insult you, persecute you, and utter every kind of evil against you [falsely] because of me. Rejoice and be glad, for your reward will be great in heaven" (Mt. 5:11-12). To live happily and walk joyfully before God we must be totally connected to Him in sincerity of purpose and integrity of life. This is a life of fruitfulness that comes from Christ Himself, and not from stereotyped observance of religious duties and stipulated rites.

The redeemed Christian should experience peace in this life, even amid the storms of life. I once watched a video of an Ethiopian Airplane that crashed shortly after takeoff. On board that airplane were two religious nuns who throughout all the moment of turbulent remained calm and apparently were in prayer as the plane made its way to its final crash. I could hear the screaming of the other passengers on board the airplane. These two religious nuns were at peace despite their imminent death. This is the kind of peace that one can have not because you like your life circumstances, but because you know God loves you, and He promises to be with you always, even into eternity. If you have a relationship with God through faith in Jesus Christ, God will equip you with His unique peace, that is not fragile, but will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus! And so, we can ask ourselves, are we at peace? When we look at our lives, are we at peace? Amid the many

activities of this advent season, have we been at peace? And if not, why not? Our God is a God of peace, he gives peace, and as we grow in relationship with him, we will grow in peace. That is one of the key indicators of how we have progressed in our relationship with God especially during this Season of Advent.

God wants us to experience His peace in our hearts. May we make good use of these remaining days of Advent to prepare ourselves so that we can be joyful recipients of the peace that Christ brings to us at Christmas, a peace that this world cannot give.
