# REFLECTION

THE HOLY FAMILY OF JESUS, MARY, AND JOSEPH December 31, 2023

Reflection "Let the Word of Christ dwell in you richly". My best, or better put, the most inspiring homily I have ever preached was the second homily as a deacon. It was the practice in my Major Seminary in those days that the deacon to assist at Mass, be it in the Seminary Chapel or in the parish Church, had to present his homily to the main celebrant (a seminary formator) for his approval at least two days in advance, without which, you cannot preach. I was to assist on the first Sunday of Lent, and I did what was expected of me by the seminary roles. The main celebrant asked me to pick up my homily after breakfast that Sunday morning. It was good to go. When I finished proclaiming the Gospel at that Mass, it sounded to me like that was my first time reading that gospel text. My message that morning was quite from the message I had in prepared and rehearsed homily.

Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly. In other versions it says: "Let the message of Christ, in all its richness find a home in you" (Col. 3:16). Richness and home are the two words that attract me most. Saint Paul wishes the Colossians that the message of Christ in all its richness may find a home in them. You may come to the realization of the richness of the message of Christ if on a Sunday you have had the privilege to attend two or three masses and listen to different priests give their reflection on the same passage of Scripture. I have the privilege of listening to members of our Gospel Sharing Group share what and how God's Word has touched them during our gospel sharing every Monday evening. It's quite amazing how varied messages can emerge from the same biblical passage, with each one of the messages taking its relevance from the same text. It is at such moments that I discover that the wealth of the gospel message is enormous indeed. You can return repeatedly to the same scripture passage and discover, upon each return, that you stumble upon another perspective to the passage which did not occur to you at earlier readings. This was my experience as a deacon on that First Sunday of Lent.

If the message of Christ in all its richness is to make its home in us, then we must look to our respective families today to see if they are modelled after the Holy Family of Nazareth, if they also qualify to be referred to as Holy families in their respective turns. We could see that the message of God in all its richness had its home in Joseph when we consider his role in the Holy Family. He was able to allow God to talk him into acting on what he thought to be the most civil way of reacting to the horrible discovery he made about Mary's pregnancy, which he played no role in. How many of us can allow God to talk us into letting go of premeditated lines of action which look answerable and responsible in the eyes of men but worthy of moderation when put before God? How many spouses would return to loving-relationship with their spouse if they discovered that they were carrying a pregnancy or another woman was carrying a pregnancy, which they played no role in their coming about or their spouse cheated on them?

We can be quick to say that the Holy Family's case was

different, that the child they found between them was God. You and I know today that Jesus is the Son of God, but I can assure you that this was not so with either Joseph or Mary, from the very beginning. Their knowledge of Christ grew with time. But, before then, they were simple parents who were disposed to act not on human instincts but were ever open to God. The fact is that, if you make room for God to influence your decisions, you will grow to discover that God comes to identify with you, as was the case with Joseph and Mary. May the feast we celebrate today dispose us to make room for God in our practical decisions so that the message of God in all its richness may indeed find its home in us and bear fruit in us.

Each new year's day the Catholic Church celebrates the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God. 'Mother of God' is a title derived from the Greek word "Theotokos", which means "God-bearer". Mary's divine motherhood was proclaimed at the Council of Ephesus in 431: 'That in Christ there are two natures, one divine and one human, but only one person'. Mary being chosen by God, the Father, to bring Jesus Christ into this world, and her willingness to do so is great cause for celebration.
