

The Sacrifice of Abraham

REFLECTION

Theme: Ultimate Sacrifice

Beloved brothers and sisters in Christ, welcome!

Today we celebrate the second Sunday of Lent, Church Year B. The Liturgy of the Word for this weekend Masses are closely related. They focus on obedience and the ultimate sacrifice.

In one of the parishes where I served in my native Cameroon, one day a young girl approached me and invited me to come to her home and talk to her parents. She had the feeling that God was calling her to serve Him as a religious. She told me that when she mentioned this to her parents (the father was a Catholic and the mother was a Baptist Christian), her parents warned her sternly never to mention that topic again in their home else they will disown her. This was a difficult task for someone just three years in the priesthood. I went to their home and was given a warm welcome. When I introduced the purpose of my visit, the smile on her parents' faces vanished. That did not deter me from finding why they were stopping their daughter from answering God's call. Their question to me was "If we had not given birth to her, she would not have even been born, talk less of become a religious. What Stella, our daughter is opting for, amounts to an abomination", the parents continued, "and we cannot allow that to happen under our watch. Becoming a religious means that she will not make her family and have children! That cannot happen!" I gently reminded them that God has blessed them with seven healthy children, and now He is asking you only for one out of the seven children and you are unable to make that little sacrifice for someone who has abundantly blessed your marriage. At the end of our two to three hours discussion, I succeeded to win over the girl's father - a Catholic Christian. Did I just say I succeeded? No, it wasn't I, but God. However, her mother remained adamant.

In our first reading from the Book of Genesis, Abraham is told by God to make an extreme sacrifice - that of his only son whom he dearly loved. Unlike the parents of Stella, Abraham does not hesitate, he takes his only son Isaac to the place of the sacrifice. This reveals the depths of Abraham's obedience to God. The story begs one question: if God put us to the test, as He did Abraham, would we pass the test? Would we have offered our only son as a holocaust to God? I am sure that most, if not all of us, would have reacted like the parents of Stella. We would want to know from God if he had forgotten that my son or daughter is my only child, and that it is unfair of Him not to have given me another child, not to talk of asking me to sacrifice him/her. We often wonder why God should choose to harvest where He has not planted. Remember this type of assessment of God in the story of the man who said to his Master "I knew you were a demanding person, harvesting where you did not plant and gathering where you did not

scatter (Mt. 25:24).

Abraham's willingness not to withhold his only son led God to provide him with an alternative: "a ram caught by its horns in the thicket". God, the first reading tells us, blessed Abraham abundantly, making his descendants as countless as the stars of the sky. God was on the side of his descendants as they conquered their enemies and made it possible for nations of the earth to find blessing through Abraham's descendants. Our blessings as Christians, stem from that blessing given that we are among the countless descendants of Abraham, our father in faith.

The story of Abraham's willingness to sacrifice his only son prefigures the divine love of God, who effectively sacrificed His Only Begotten Son on the Cross of Calvary for our redemption. Through the sacrifice of His Only Begotten Son, God has won over many sons and daughters.

As with Abraham, God does not expect us to sacrifice our sons or daughters, or ourselves as holocausts. Notably during this season of Lent, God expects us to show our obedience and readiness to sacrifice for Him through fasting, almsgiving, and repentance for our sins. No sacrifice is too small. None is too easy to consent. God wants us to honor Him by giving our lives in the service of others as the young girl Stella in my story wanted to do and is now doing just that – serving the church and world as a religious in the imitation of Christ who gave up his life freely in the service of his brothers and sisters.

Dear sisters and brothers in Christ, may God help us to honor our Lenten pledges to fast from meat on Fridays; our promise to attend more Masses a week than the weekend Mass alone. Let us turn the money we save by skipping our favorable bottle of beer, or glass of wine and liquor to alms for the poor and the needy. Let us pray for strength to spend our lives for others.


