

REFLECTION

Welcome!

Beloved sisters and brothers in Christ, today we celebrate the Fourth Sunday of Lent in Church Year B. This Sunday is known as Laetare Sunday. What is Laetare Sunday? "Laetare" is Latin for "rejoice". So, Laetare Sunday is 'Sunday of joy'. Joy amidst our Lenten fast and penance. Laetare Sunday gets its name from the first few words of the Entrance Antiphon for the Mass of the day. "Rejoice, Jerusalem, ... Be joyful, all who were mourning; exult and be satisfied at her consoling breast" (Is. 66:10-11). "This Sunday was once called 'Refreshment Sunday', or the 'Sunday of the Five Loaves', for the miracle of the boy with loaves and fishes in the Gospel of John" (Wikipedia).

It is a wonderful midway point for us to recollect ourselves and to put our penitence in perspective once again.

Why does the Church invite us to rejoice in the midst of our Lenten observance? One of the reasons for Laetare Sunday is that it marks the half-way point of our Lenten journey, reminding us that Easter is enticingly near, the celebration of Christ's rising from the dead and the salvation He has won for us. It is a wonderful point on our Lenten journey for us to recollect ourselves and to put our penitence in perspective once again.

Our Gospel passage suggests yet another reason we should rejoice today. It says: "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life." God loved us into existence and redeemed us through the Death and Resurrection of the Son, so that through Him we may have eternal life". To have eternal life entails that we must leave the world of darkness. the world of evil and sin, and come into the world of light. We must model our lives after the example of Jesus. In a practical sense, it means that we must be prepared to step out of darkness and the lure of sin into the light for the love of God who sent his Son into the world not to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through Him. There is no middle ground. A choice must be made for or against the Son of God. This is the choice we all made at our baptism for those who are already baptized, which we renew at all Easter Vigil and Easter Sunday Masses when we reject sin and profess our faith in Christ Jesus: "Do you reject Satan?" "... I do"... "Do you believe in the God the Father, almighty, creator of heaven and earth?" "... I do."

But the unfortunate thing is that very many people have shown that they prefer darkness to light, as Christ notes in today's Gospel passage: "And this is the verdict, that the light came into the world, but people preferred darkness to light". This conclusion of Jesus came out clearly at His judgement in Pilate's Court when the crowd demanded the release of Barabbas, a known criminal, and the condemnation of Christ against whom they could not bring any credible accusation. Even Pilate himself, after cross examining Christ, declared that he found no case against Him. And yet they would shout down Pilate demanding for the condemnation of Jesus and the release of Barabbas. There was no other explanation for their bias against Jesus other than that they were bought over by the Chief Priests and the Elders. This is clearly a willful decision to take the side of darkness in preference to the light.

Sadly, in our world there are far too many Christians who are still held in darkness. Under this state they are prone to wicked deeds, for example, worship idols, murder, adultery, and fornication, stealing, lying, drunkenness, bribery and other evils. They are inclined to be filled with malice, envy, hatred and so forth. Those who indulge in these activities, in the words, prefer darkness to light and do not want to come towards the light, so that their works might not be exposed.

The truth is that nothing in all creation is hidden from God's sight. Everything is uncovered and laid bare before the eyes of him to whom we must give account. God will indeed "bring to light the hidden things of darkness and reveal the counsels of the hearts" (1 Cor. 4:5). "For there is nothing hidden that will not become visible, and nothing secret that will not be known and come to light" (Mt. 8:17). Therefore, the challenge for all of us today is that we live in such a way that we are not ashamed to have "light" shine on our deeds. How does your life presently stand up under the searching light of God's scrutiny? On this "Rejoice Sunday" the only condition to be joyful and eventually to enter the joy that lasts forever at the end of our earthly pilgrimage is to live as a child of the light every second of our life.

Reflection questions:

Well, as I said at the beginning, we are exactly twentyone days to Easter Sunday. Having gone thus far, it is time to pause and ask yourself, how you have lived out in your own life the Lenten practices of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving?

What are some of the unhealthy habits that keep me away from God that have I gotten rid of?

Vegetable Gardens at St. Bernadette's

Why should you consider growing vegetables either at the St. Bernadette's vegetable gardens or at your own home?



- Family Community Service- Donate locally to organizations that relieve hunger. e.g., Hedgesville Loaves and Fishes, Martinsburg Union Rescue Mission, Immanuel's House, St. Vincent De Paul Society clients, Mary's Refuge, etc.
- Do Corporal Works of Mercy
- Learn or share knowledge of how to grow a better garden with other parishioners.
- Know precisely what went into growing the vegetables.
- Possibly become part of a fresh produce distribution network which provides thousands of servings per year to those in need.
- Assist home gardeners by gleaning their excess produce and tree fruits.
- Enjoy a portion of the produce raised in your home at family meals.

During the 2023 growing season, 3 routine volunteers and 2 occasional volunteers worked in the St. Bernadette Vegetable Gardens with" Mother Nature" and Our Lord's blessing to produce about \$450 of fresh vegetables in an area smaller than a one car garage (about 150 square feet).

For this ministry to flourish, we need more parishioners, including children, to help. Garden work parties have already happened. If interested contact me soon.

Finance Council Update

February 2024

- 1. Strategic Plan Committee Finances are in good shape, but we continue to have maintenance and capital needs to keep the facilities in excellent shape. Much of the work is done through volunteers, led by Joe and Elaine Comer. The Finance Council has established a Strategic Plan committee with the objective to develop a long term for the use of the Parish grounds. St Bernadette is within a high growth area of Berkeley County and as the parish grows a plan should be in place to accommodate the growth. The plan will define the need for any new or enlarged buildings and capital expenditures, along with estimates of future costs. Members include:

- Catholic Sharing Appeal You will soon be receiving information on this year's appeal.
 The goal this year is like last year at \$20,995. The first 50% goes to the Diocesan program. Any money above \$10,498 will be sent back to St Bernadette, assessment free. Please continue our good record.
- We just received another grant from the Catholic Sharing Appeal for the purchase of 9
 security cameras for exterior views of our proper ty. This is another benefit from the
 Diocese for reaching our goal. Please give generously.
- 4. We now have 20 parishioners that completed the CPR/AED training. They are prepared but all sincerely wish they will never be required. Congratulations to those! The AED was purchased with a grant from the Catholic Sharing Appeal.
- Special Collections in March are for the Diocesan Priest Retirement Fund and the Pontifical Good Friday Holy Land Collection.
- Online giving This is an easy way to donate on a regular basis. All you need to do is hit

COMMENTS: written on 1/31/2024 (It was a good year)

 Revenue increased significantly this year. Sunday collections and maintenance capital both increased. Income received from the Catholic Sharing Appeal was less than the previous years, but we did achieve goal and received additional funds to purchase the AED located in the Narthex. This month 19 volunteers were trained and certified for CPR and the use of the AED in an emergency cardiac arrest.

Memorials and Donations increased. This includes donations from people over 72, who donate some of their required minimum distributions (RMD) from their IRA directly to St Bernadette as a tax advantage.

The Other category includes a one time receipt through the Diocese of \$7000 from the Govt COVID program, interest received on our reserve CD account, and other unassessed income such as stipends.

- 2.) The Parish financial position enabled us to increase our Reserves in our CD account. One reason for this is the assistance we have received from the Diocese in terms of Grant Money. By the end of 2023, we have received over \$60,000. This includes assistance for renovating McFadden Hall, the parking lot, the handicap walkway. We have several projects planned. They include installing a prayer garden and renovating the 2nd floor of the rectory after the damage from the burst pipes last year.
- 3.) Catholic Sharing Appeal is a unique program in our Diocese. Each parish receives a goal. The first 50% of the goal stays at the Diocese to assist Bishop Mark in charitable and educational areas. No receipts stay at the Diocese office. Any money received from St Bernadette parishioners above 50% is returned to the parish, free of the usual revenue assessments for Cathedraticum and the the Priest Retirement and Health. WE NEED YOU TO SUPPORT THE CSA SO WE CAN ACHIEVE THE PARISH GOAL! And continue to receive grant money. Our goal for 2024 is \$20,995. Based on past results, this goal is achievable.
- Expenditures have been within reason. We continue to maintain our facilities. These expenditures would be much larger if not for the grant money and volunteers that have stepped forward. Thank you volunteers! Diocesan fees include Cathedraticum and PHRA.

Cathedraticum is a tax on assessable income usually used by Bishops to fund chancery operations. Our Diocese is different in that the tax is entirely returned to small parishes to support wages, benefits, and operations in areas where collections are insufficient. The base tax rate is 3%. The PHRA is an insurance program for Diocesan Priest Health and Retirement. It is funded by Parishes

at a base rate of 6% of assessed income plus a monthly premium for each priest in the Pansh..

5.) St Bernadette is a growing Parish, with generous parishioners. In addition to the many volunteer hours, You have donated money, food, clothing and sleeping bags for many in West Virginia, Berkeley County, World Missions, Ukraine and Cameroon. Thank you for your generosity of your time, talent and treasure!

6.) Our goals this year are to share your talents with our members, to begin a strategic plan process and to hire an accountant.
