REFLECTION

Beloved brothers and sisters in Christ, welcome!

This weekend we gather as a Catholic Christian family to celebrate the twenty-seven Sunday Ordinary Time Year A. The readings invite us to reflect on God's care for His people as a good gardener cares for his vine-yard. We are also invited to reflect on our response to His invitation to cooperate with Him in the building of His Kingdom here on earth – a Kingdom of justice, love, and peace.

Peter and Anne raised four children but are now alone. They feel disappointed and sad. Anne tells us why.

'We did everything we could for those children. We wanted them to have the things we didn't have. We bought a house. Peter had to do a lot of overtime to be able to keep up with the mortgage repayments. Times were hard. Life was a constant struggle. Still, those children never lacked anything.

'Many's the night I didn't get a wink of sleep because of them. They had a lot of illnesses when they were young but, thank God, in time they grew out of them. Though we saw some of our neighbors going regularly to the pub, we hardly ever went out. We saw others going abroad for their holidays, but we could never afford to do that. But we gladly sacrificed these things for the sake of the children.

'We sent them to good schools. They never lacked money for books or school outings. They were always well dressed. We taught them good values. We taught them their religion, and we tried to give them good example. And just look at how they have repaid us. They say that good example rubs off on the children. Well, in our case, it didn't.

'John (the oldest) quit university and went into the pub business. He works hard, and by all accounts is doing well. He now owns three pubs. But money has become his god. Though he sends us a couple of bottles at Christmas, we hardly ever see him.

'Anne, a teacher, married a fellow with a big job. They don't believe in having children. They rarely come to see us, though we get cards from them from exotic places.

'Peter has three children and seemed to be happily married. But then he suddenly left his wife and went to live with a young girl. He never shows up.

'Paul, our baby, is still unmarried. He's touring the world like a hippie. Doesn't believe in working or settling down. Last word we got from him he was somewhere in Australia.

'None of them go to Church. Now what more could we have done for them? Do we deserve to be treated like this?' (This story is from 'New Sunday & Holy Day Liturgies, Year A, by Flor McCarthy, SDB)

Perhaps some of us feel and can even identify with the

disappointed Anne and Peter. You too had tried, as best you could, to give the children just the best. Those of us parents know how much of our time is taken by our children. There are so many things to be done for them. Some of us parents, don't have 'a life'; it is either dropping off the child at school, or for this or that extracurricular activity.

Today's first reading seems to suggest that even God sometimes feels like this - disappointed. "What more could I have done for my vineyard that I have not done?' is a cry from the heart. The prophet Isaiah compares the people of Israel - God's people - to a vineyard. This vineyard had been given special care by God, but instead of giving Him good and sweet grapes, it had only produced sour ones. All He gets in return for the love He has shown them is utter ingratitude sin, infidelity, oppression and exploitation, hatred, bloodshed, a religion of ceremonies and external cult without conversion of the heart. In the Gospel too, the landowner does everything right! He makes his vineyard a first-class vineyard that gives the tenants every advantage. Yet the tenants to whom he leases the vinevard are unproductive, wicked, and greedy.

We are God's vineyard and are beautifully made to produce good fruit. The Jewish leaders to whom this parable was originally told failed to produce good fruit. Instead of producing justice, they produced bloodshed; instead of producing righteousness, they produced distress. Consequently, they are disenfranchised, and the vineyard is passed on to other tenants (Church).

Beloved in Christ, God has given us gifts and opportunities and He expects us to bear the fruit for the Kingdom. We have often failed Him. This weekend's Liturgy of the Word is a reminder to us that the judgement of destruction pronounced on the tenants is a warning to us, the new tenants. God is interested in the people who will bear the fruit for the Kingdom. Let's pray for the grace to give back to God our Father the fruits He expects to get from us.
